Kontakion of Saints Constantine and Helen

"Today, Constantine with his mother Helen present the cross, the most precious wood. It shames the unbelievers. It is a weapon of faithful kings against their adversaries. A great sign has come forth which is awesome in battle."

Feast Day: Sunday, May 21

Saint Constantine and Helen, Equal to the Apostles

Constantine was the son of Constantius Chlorus, the ruler of the westernmost part of the Roman Empire and the blessed Helen. He was born in 272 in Naissus of Dardania, a city in Hellespont. When his father died in 306, he was proclaimed successor to his throne. When in 312 Maxentius and Maximinus had joined forces against him, Constantine marched into Italy with his troops. He saw in the midday sun, a radiant pillar in the form of a cross with the words: "By this shalt thou conquer." The following night, Jesus Christ appeared to Constantine in a dream and declared to him the power of the cross and its significance.

The following day a banner was prepared in the form of a cross, and inscribed on it the name Jesus Christ. On October 28th, he attacked and mightily conquered Maxentius. The next day, Constantine triumphantly entered Rome and was proclaimed the emperor of the West by the Senate, while his brother-in-law, Licinius, ruled in the East. Licinius, out of malice, later persecuted Christians, and Constantine fought once again and destroyed him in 324. He then became the monarch over the West and the East. Constantine ended persecutions against the Church, and Christianity triumphed and idolatry was overthrown.

In 325 Constantine gathered the first Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, which he himself personally addressed. He solemnly was inaugurated in 330 and named the new capital after himself, Constantinople. When Constantine became ill near Nicomedia, he requested to receive divine Baptism. He died in 337, having lived to the age of 65. His remains were deposed to the Church of the Holy Apostles in Constantinople, which had been built by him.

After Constantine had made the faith of Christ triumphant throughout the Roman Empire, his mother, Helen, took a journey to Jerusalem and found the Holy Cross which our Lord was crucified. She then erected churches in Jerusalem at the sites of the Crucifixion and Resurrection, in Bethlehem at the cave where Jesus was born, another on the Mount of Olives where he ascended into Heaven and in many other places throughout the Holy Land, Cyprus and elsewhere. She was glorified for her piety and departed to the Lord at about 80 years of age in 330.

Artemis Vrettos, Hamilton, New Jersey died on Monday, January 16, 2017, at Hamilton Continuing Care Center. She was 96 years old. Artemis was born on April 20, 1920 in Carthage, New York to the late Simeon and Avril Servetas Rochonchou. She was a graduate of Carthage High School and resided most of her life in the Trenton and Hamilton areas in New Jersey. She was a homemaker and a bookkeeper for many years at the Trenton Stove in Trenton.

Aretmis was an active member of Saint George Greek Orthodox Church in Hamilton, which was founded by her maternal grandfather, the late Reverend Father George Servetas. She had served as secretary and bookkeeper for many years at the church and had sung in the choir and taught Sunday School. Artemis shared 59 years with her husband, the late Anthony Vrettos.

She was predeceased by her two sisters, Margaret Theodoris and Georgia Fokides. She is survived by a daughter and son-in-law, Anne and Nicholas Karnavas, New Port Richey, Florida; two sons and daughters-in-

law, Nicholas and Bonnie Vrettos, Williamsburg, Virginia and John and Angela Vrettos, Interlaken, New Jersey; a brother and sister-in-law, James and Tina Rochonchou, Yardville, New Jersey; eight grandchildren, 16 greatgrand children and many nieces, nephews and cousins.

For many years, Artemis was a visitor to Saint Vasilios Greek Orthodox Church, Watertown, New York, and her paternal uncle, George Ronson, was a founding member of Saint Vasilios Church. The funeral service was held on Thursday, January 19, at 11:00 a.m. at Saint George Greek Orthodox Church, Hamilton. Burial was at Greenwood Cemetery, Hamilton.
